From the very beginning of the forced replacement from Ukraine to the UK, fleeing from war, I began active professional and social activities in a new place. Pride did not allow me to "sit on benefits", so I used all my professional and social resources to establish local connections, as well as socio-cultural integration. It was especially important to quickly become an economically active social unit. For this purpose, several professional communities were founded, practical experience was gained in local companies and, as a result, after a year and a half in the UK, I own two companies (Master Goal Ltd and Human Transformation CIC) specializing in integration coaching, business consulting, mental health support, education, and support for people with disabilities. We have several unique projects to support the Ukrainian refugee community, as well as local communities and business entities.

Homes for Ukraine Thank You Payments

The Chancellor announced that Homes for Ukraine hosts will continue to receive £500 a month as a 'thank you' for their ongoing support for their Ukrainian guests for a third year of sponsorship.

The payment has been extended for a further year to reflect the continued generosity of sponsors in hosting guests from Ukraine over a longer period of time than anyone expected, and to ensure that those wishing to provide ongoing sanctuary can do so as the conflict continues.

Councils will continue to receive £5,900 per person for new Homes for Ukraine arrivals to provide wrap-around-support and deliver statutory services

Housing

The Government is increasing the Local Housing Allowance to cover the 30th percentiles of Local rents. This will help make housing costs more affordable for private renters in receipt of benefits. 1.6 million Lowincome households will be better off, with an average gain of £800 in 2024-25. Rates will be raised across Great Britain in April 2024.

£120m is also being made available across the UK, Including Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland, to help councils with Ukraine and homelessness pressures. Local authorities will be able to use some of his funding to support Ukrainian households who can no longer remain in sponsorship to help access settled accommodation.

A Ukrainian Excursion to York by Bus

Setting a unique tone for exploration, a group of Ukrainian adventurers, orchestrated by the NB4U volunteer organization, opted for a scenic bus journey to York. The rhythmic hum of the engine and winding roads provided a backdrop for the group to bond over landscapes, creating connections during the adventure.

In York, history unfolded at the Jorvik Viking Centre, and the narrow streets of the Shambles became a backdrop for shared moments. The National Railway Museum showcased the evolution of transportation, with the bus travellers appreciating the diversity of locomotives and carriages.

A visit to the iconic York Minster, with its towering presence and centuries of history, left the group in awe, adding a spiritual and architectural dimension to their cultural experience.

Evenings in York were spent in local pubs, where the Ukrainian group shared cultural insights, creating lasting memories.

At the end of our journey we commemorated Holodomor Memorial Day in Ukraine. On this day people traditionally light candles at 4pm so as the clock bells of York Minster struck four we lit candles and places them on the cathedral steps, we then sang the Ukrainian National Anthem and held a minutes silence in remembrance.

Ukraine support

Ivanna is married to Petro in the military and initially wished to remain in Ukraine to see her husband when he had leave from the front. However, as the war dragged on and she noted her daughter's increasing trauma when the air raid sirens went off and they were required to go into the cellar, she decided on applying for a UK visa.

Moved by the invasion of Ukraine and feeling they had space in their home and could help, Colin and Lucy signed up to host a Ukrainian family. In early September this year they headed to Manchester airport to pick up Ivanna and her 4-year-old child Veronika.

RMC was awarded the Birmingham City Council's Homes for Ukraine contract in August, which resulted in this match being one of our first hosts and guests to support. Natalia, our Ukrainian Family Support Worker, was on hand to assist with the orientation arrangements. Colin states:

"The support early on, to get started, was really important. Natalia could also be a voice for Ivanna, whose English was initially almost non-existent."

Both hosts and guest commented on the helpful guidance from RMC on house rules and how useful it was to set boundaries at the outset. Ivanna was a little concerned about how rigid these 'rules' would be but commented that the tone of her hosts' letter

was friendly and there has been flexibility as they had established a house-share. Significantly both parties have been respectful and accommodating of each other. Veronika was affectionately described as "a little rocket fizzing round the house" bringing energy into the home. Ivanna, on the other hand, is keen to ensure that her daughter is not too clingy and demanding.

RMC recognises the generosity of many hosts and people in the community. Our caseworker has been on hand to support the newly arrived family, but Colin and Lucy have also played a valuable role. Within 2 weeks of arrival Veronika was able to start school. Members of the Parent Teacher Association supplied a school uniform and other necessities.

Both hosts and Natalia enthused about the progress that Ivanna has made in learning English. She is clearly motivated and has taken advantage of opportunities in the local area. North Birmingham for Ukraine provides ESOL twice a week and an English teacher gives additional informal tuition, subsidised thoughtfully by the hosts.

When asked about challenges, Lucy and Colin acknowledged that communication has sometimes been difficult (google translate is not always accurate) and occasionally there is a clash over timings in cooking or washing. However, they appreciate Ivanna's openness to new experiences. Discovering Chinese and Indian food (not common in Ukraine) has been a hit, and Ivanna is now volunteering at a charity shop and striving to find work.

Ivanna, in turn, talked of the challenge of everything being "new and different". She marvelled though on how quickly she and her daughter had adapted to their new environment. She is grateful for the support of RMC and her hosts and that they are safe and settled.

Your journey with the Learning Disabilities Enablement Team:



Our team is made up of occupational therapists (OT), enablement assistants and enablement officers.

An OT will:

- Contact you and arrange to meet you to talk to you about what you want/need to do more independently at home or when outside in your local community
- Talk to you about how you can work together to achieve your goals
- Design a step by step plan with you to achieve your goals
- See if you need equipment or home adaptations to make you safe
- · and any further support you may need

The Enablement Team will:

- Introduce you to a weekly enablement assistant, who is the same person each week who will work with you on your goals for up to 6 months
- Each week your enablement assistant will visit you at home normally at the same time and day, to work on your goals using your step by step plan

Some examples of the goals we work on:



Cookery skills



Money management/ budgeting



Personal care/
Dressing yourself



Laundry/Cleaning



Shopping and more....

Steps to self empowerment:

We realise that everyone is at different steps to feeling empowered, but working together we will support you through your journey.

Who will come to visit me?

An Occupational therapist (OT) will visit you at your home to talk to you about enablement and what it means to you.

An OT is a person who listens to what you want to achieve and empowers you to reach your goals. OTs work with people across all age groups to do the things they want to do and need to do in their lives.

An OT will ask you how you are managing your daily tasks and will work with you to be as independent as you can be.

This could mean giving you tips on how to make tasks easier or giving you equipment or adaptations around your home.



What is the Learning Disability Enablement Team?

We are a team of enthusiastic people who teach daily living skills to people in their own homes and outside, we provide a weekly service, to visit you at home and work on tasks you need and want to do. Our team is made up of occupational therapists (OTs), enablement assistants and enablement officers

Dates for your calendar - December

St Nicholas Day - 6th December

This holiday has deep roots in Ukrainian culture and has been celebrated since the 11th century and the times of Kievan Rus.

Children write letters to St. Nikolas and expect for a miracle. On the night before the holiday, every child waits for gifts, which St. Nicholas will put under the pillow. Children, who behaved well, receive sweets, cookies, gingerbread, some small presents. But the naughty kids should be prepared to find a twig under the pillow.

St. Nicholas Day is also beloved by adults. People wish each other all the best and visit relatives. This holiday also starts winter celebrations and preparation for the New Year and Christmas festivities.



Christmas Day - 25th December
